

Pupil Premium at Lansbury Bridge

The pupil premium grant (PPG) is additional funding given to schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and to help close the gap between those disadvantaged students and their peers.

In the 2014 to 2015 financial year we received the following funding for each child registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years:

- Primary Ever 6- £1,300 for primary-aged pupils
- Secondary Ever 6-£935 for secondary-aged pupils

We also received £1,900 for each pupil who:

- has been looked after for 1 day or more
- has been adopted from care
- has left care under:
 - a special guardianship order
 - a residence order
 - a child arrangement order

45% of our students are eligible for the PPG and the total amount of funding which we received is £113,305. This is broken down as follows:

The Pupil Premium funding that is received by the school annually is used in a variety of ways in order to improve pupil attainment and to help overcome any barriers to learning. We have utilised strategies from a variety of sources in an effort to 'narrow the gap' between all groups of children so that everybody succeeds.

The Headteacher has the discretion to determine how this funding is spent in order to tackle what exists between disadvantaged students (PPG) and non-disadvantaged pupils (NPPG).

How We Spend the Money

Mentoring is provided to children experiencing emotional and behavioural difficulties. Data suggests this has a good impact in promoting attendance, standards of order and behaviour. There are three Mentors with timetabled mentoring sessions working with our most disadvantaged children.

School has been able to employ a full time **Speech and Language Therapist** to complement the health authority team and run **social communication** groups with our Pupil Premium students. The SLT and the **Communication Support Assistant** have created a **Communication Group** with expertise in **AAC- Augmentative and Alternative Communication**. The extra training and the support given to teachers by our Communication Champions in the classroom is clearly having a direct positive impact on students' Communication targets and students' progress.

Opportunities for **physical and health development** are subsidised to all students. Examples of these are Health and Well Being Week, Let's Grow Week, Bikeability, John Muir Award, KS1 Multi Skills, Scarecrow Festival and Horticulture activities organised by our **Curriculum Enrichment/Sports Co-ordinator**. This post is partly funded by our PPG.

The Curriculum Enrichment Co-ordinator also provides a broad and exciting range of **after-school activities** to all students: football, choir, multi-sensory, dance, drama, social club, art and craft, gym, and multi-skills/sports.

Pupil Premium has been used to facilitate **special days** such as the Poetry Day and the **residential trip** to Bendrig of Y11 students (plus two Year 10 students). This residential trip was supported using pupil premium money bringing down costs considerably for parents.

KS4 students have had access to a range of **externally accredited options** of their choice such as Horticulture, Cycling and Aromatherapy. **Building Futures** provides vocational opportunities in building trades for students in KS4.

The children have been enthusiastic about the extra learning opportunities provided increasing motivation, engagement, and attendance and improving behaviour.
